Dear Parents/Guardians:

As you may have heard, a new influenza virus, called the 2009 H1N1 influenza virus, was first identified in the United States in late April 2009. The virus has caused illness ranging from mild to severe, and many children have been affected. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices has recommended that children and young adults aged 6 months through 24 years be vaccinated against 2009 H1N1 as soon as the vaccine is available.

Vaccination is the best way to protect your child from this potentially serious disease. At this time, the Peabody Health Department has a limited quantity of 2009 H1N1 influenza vaccine and will be prioritizing it for elementary-aged children.

The first scheduled clinic for **elementary-aged children** is scheduled for Saturday, November 14, 2009. It will be held from 10:00 am until 1:00 pm at the Torigian Community Life Center at 79 Central Street, Peabody. The clinic is for Peabody children in grades kindergarten through grade 5. **Children MUST be accompanied by parents/guardians.** No one will be admitted to the clinic prior to 10 am. There is no fee for the vaccine, but proof of Peabody residency will be required.

Unfortunately, supply is limited at this time and will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. **Reservations WILL NOT be accepted.** Other household members will not be eligible to receive vaccine at this time, unless they also fall into this priority group.

We do expect to receive more vaccine and plan to hold additional clinics throughout the fall and winter.
