St. John the Baptist School Summer Reading Requirements for students Entering Grade 8

Students entering Grade 8 will be responsible for completing four books over the summer. Students may choose three of the four books, one each from a different category. The Mandatory fourth book should be purchased as students will be highlighting and writing in it. After reading each book students will complete written assignments which will be due the first day of school.

Mandatory Reading Assignment Farenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury

- 1. Put your name in the book on the inside of the front cover.
- 2. Highlight any new vocabulary words you do not recognize. Create a list by Chapter and define the words. We will generate a final list of words together and you will be tested on them. Be sure you have good working definitions!
- 3. Return to the book after you have finished reading it and choose one character which interests you. Underline every scene which alludes to your chosen character. Make a list of that character's personality traits starting at the beginning of the story until the end. Note the ways in which your chosen character changes and write a paragraph summarizing those changes. Be prepared to discuss your findings in class.
- 4. Create a portrait of your chosen character on a half-size sheet of poster board. Include symbols on the poster of objects that reflect events in the story or important aspects of your character. These do not have to be drawn but may not be computer images or copies. Be creative! You will be sharing these in class.
- 5. Create a thesis statement or two for the book. The statement should be a concrete idea which you came away with after reading the book and which you would like to explore further. This statement should be no more than four lines.

Choose three books from the attached list. You must read one of the classics listed, one of the ALA Newbery Medal Winners or Newbery Honor books and one book from the contemporary list. Each list contains a variety of reading skill levels, be sure to challenge yourself! Read beyond the four if you are able to! I especially encourage you to take advantage of the "Getting Ready for High School List" throughout our year together. Students who love reading will have the option of joining our new book club which will run once a week during lunch/recess time.

Assignment for each book:

- 1. Write a letter from the main character's point of view which describes the main problem the main character faces in the story. The journal entry should:
 - a. Be written in complete paragraphs with attention to details, with special attention to how the main character feels dealing with this crisis at different phases of the story.
 - b. Include a date that reflects the 'date' the character wrote the entry.
- 2. Write a second letter from a secondhand character's point of view to the main character, and in it describe the solution to the main character's problem as it happened in the story.
- 3. These will be collected the first day of class.

*The more challenging choices are asterisked.
